Challenges in local waste management

- Increasing amounts of municipal waste
- Basic services of collection and transport
- Often open dumps
- Little recycling initiatives
- Specific waste issues
 - War debris
 - Construction and demolition waste
 - Oil and gas waste

- There is a sustainability gap by inadequate WM systems:
 - Impact on living quality for citizens (odor, visible pollution, health issues)
 - Negative environmental impacts : pollution, degradation, climate effect, etc.
 - Indirect negative costs for the society: long-term balance costs for remediation, health costs, etc.
 - Limiting economic growth: impact on foreign investments, missing infrastructure for local industry, wasting resources, etc.
- How to create the motivation to tackle the waste issue?
 - Enhanced policies that would foster the adoptions in legal framework and care for enforcement
 - Examples and business cases for effective and efficient Waste Management
 - Approaches that are less vulnerable for exploitation and fraud
 - Creating a higher commitment in the population for improvements in WM









The status of private sector engagement

- Waste management is largely poorly subsidized, which hinders profitable and sustainable business models
- Currently, waste management companies are usually only logistics companies, no treatment plants (private investments can hardly be covered)
- Gate fee structures are not clearly regulated respectively not existing (steady payments). Who
 pays when, how much?

Not to forget:

• A professional and sustainable disposal or treatment of non-valuable waste streams always has a negative cost balance without external financing/subsidy and/or market distortions.



Private sector activities: plastic recycling


- Plastic recycling in low amounts from PET bottles and LDPE plastics
- Regranulates mainly going to neighboring countries

 Approaches of international cement companies to establish RDF structure in Iraq for local cement kilns










Private sector development and job creation

- Entrepreneurship program with the aim of developing mature business plans
- Accompanying the piloting of selected business plans
- Training of local mentors / coaches who will support business initiatives and innovative approaches
- Advice to local actors to identify possible innovation potential
- Support of business relationships with international technology companies
- Cooperation with chambers and partners from the private sector
- Elaboration of policy papers (white paper) as a basis for "Public-Private-Dialogue" (PPD)














The WastePreneur program & platform
