Project Area: Central Asia and Afghanistan (with cross-regional components)

Upcoming Activities:

- Women in Water Management Network in CA and Afghanistan:
 - UN 2023 Water Conference (22-24 March, New York).
 - Monthly capacity-building and knowledge exchange activities for women water professionals in CA and A.
- Capacity building for water professionals in water diplomacy, negotiation, mediation, peacebuilding and conflict prevention, including interactive simulations.
- Organization of awareness-raising events on climate change implications on transboundary water management, including gender considerations.

Strengthening national and regional capacities and co-operation on Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) in Central Asia, including as a response to climate change

- Started in 2019
- Implemented in close collaboration with UNECE
- Donor: German Environment Agency (UBA)
- Beneficiaries: Kazakhstan, Kyrgyz Republic, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan
- · Results:
 - Raising awareness and strengthening capacities about SEA and Environmental Impact Assessment
 - **Enhancing co-operation** within and across countries
 - ➤ Needs assessment and action plan for **establishing national SEA systems**











- Phase II of the project expected to start in mid 2023
- It will further support the establishment of effective national SEA systems and facilitate **transboundary consultation** in environmental impact assessment in Central Asia, as a contribution to sustainable economic development


<u>Objective</u>: to enhance the resilience of border communities in Central Asia to address challenges imposed by
